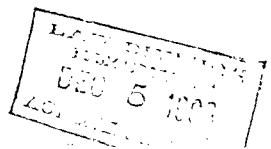

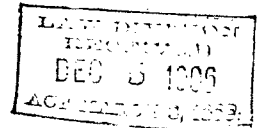

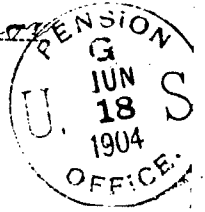

case as follows: Mr Snow it appears has given a statement that we had ceased living as Man & Wife before he went away March 24 1888, the day I might before he went he was with me as friendly as we ever were, he had been running the engine at the Sawyer & Layton in Westboro, I was keeping house for my Son a short way from the Sawyer & Layton, they were in the straw shop, he as foreman his wife as fore lady, I see from them \$5.00 per week had I in family I done every part of the work, Mr Snow came I went as he pleased & was used well by all, Mr Snow did not give me one penny that he earned, & I never knew how it was spent, the morning he went away he said he had not money enough to pay his way, I asked one to lend him \$5.00, I did not it has never been returned, although he was to see \$100 or more when he got to Ill, he was to go to work on the B. & O. road while they were on a strike, he was to run from Chatter to Paw Paw, he had not sent me a \$100 in all the years he was gone, I learned he had lived with another woman while there, I had a long hard sickness of nervous prostration My Son informed him of it he did not send me any assistance, but when he thought me dead, sent a woman to look after a little property my late Father had left, (when she found me alive she went back he did not ask me to go & live with him, or make any request that we should have a home together as he had not in 18 years sent me any aid what ever I did not feel it any duty to furnish a home for him I told him I did not want to see him, that I had always tried to do the best I could to be an Honorable, Industrious, Prudent, & Loving Mother & Wife (so you did he said) as I hope for peace after crossing the great divide, that was said at my door after he came back, I had failed with age & could not well follow Nursing & house keeping, so took 7 years ago an old Gentleman 82 years old to board rec \$5.00 per week, I did not have much to spare after house rent, fuel & provisions were paid for, but do not owe any thing but good will to any one, Mr Snow has boasted that I never shall have a part of his pension, & has gone all he could to injure me, for no reason only my refusing to make a home for him & he is capable of any lie or fraud to accomplish his wishes) he has a jealous disposition & has made my life very unpleasant by it, if my Dear kind Father & Mother were alive he would not dare to make the statement, that he told him he

had ought to shoot us both, it was cowardly to bring his Dear Name into his deception because he is just contradicting it, my Father was the soul of honor. I always loved & honored his family, he would not have said that to Mr Snow if it could have ^{been} true, as he never had even respect for him, why Mr Snow stated Mr Rogers & I went to Matich I dont understand as all the time I knew of Mr Rogers was while I lived in my Fathers house, in Matich, he was only there for a short season while caring for a neighbors home while they were away I never saw or heard from him afterwards. I had never spoken to the Man, till one thanksgiving day I had a friend visiting me Mr Snow was away, we were quite anxious to go to Mr Snows Parthers, I had failed to find a horse, Mr Rogers happened in the yard to see my Father, as he had a horse I went out & asked him if he would let it to us, he said he had strict orders never to let the horse but he could go & take us there if we would like to have him, we were glad to have him, so we went & enjoyed our selves & came home in the evening about 10 o'clock, Mr Snow did not like it, that is all there is to that statement, his kissing statement seems absurd, if we was inclined to be as bad as he represented I should think they would have art enough to conceal it from a child old enough to tell his Papa, I had my 4 little Boys to care for from 1 year to 7, I when Mr Snow was home he had a number of shoe makers to keep us home & at work, I do not remember of going to Matich since I was married, I certainly not with Mr Rogers, I further declares that I have no interest in said case and I am not concerned in its prosecution.

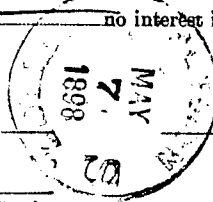

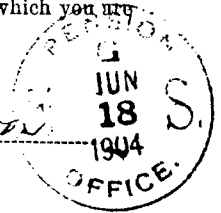

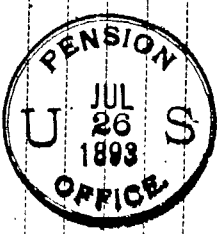
